More than anything else, Bikar was identified with the Miss Ohio Scholarship Pageant, which he shot for four decades. He and wife Lou were a fixture at that pageant and many others.

He just so firmly believed in the Miss Ohio program," said Sharon Herlihy, contestant chairwoman and traveling companion to Atlantic City. He started covering it when it was still in Sandusky."

He was always promoting the program wherever he went," Herlihy said. He treated the staff and contestants almost like royalty. He was just an amazing man.'

Bikar was a man who touched the lives of many. At least once a week, people ask about Jim when I'm out on the street," News Journal Photo Editor Dave Polcyn said. He'd come into contact with a lot of people over the years.

Because of failing health, Bikar retired from the News Journal in 1998. "I was sorry to see him retire," Polcyn said. "He had a good attitude and was a pleasure to have around. He was a great employee and friend. He loved to photograph kids. He liked to say that the only difference between him and the kids was that he was prematurely losing his hair."

Former News Journal photographer Jeff Sprang met Bikar in 1970. Sprang was a part-time shooter then while he attended college.

He taught me a lot about the news busi-ness," Sprang said. You could always count on Jim; he was always ready for anything."

In addition to his wife of 43 years, Bikar is survived by two daughters.


Executive Producer for the morning show. Mahon is a former P.O.Y. for Region 2 and is part of the 2000 Station of the Year crew from KARE.

Odds 'n ends

The Gannett Foundation has sold *The Marietta Times* to Ogden Newspapers Inc. of Wheeling, WV. With the addition of The Times, Ogden Newspapers now has 38 daily newspapers, seven of which are located in Ohio.

The Akron Beacon Journal is now available in CD format. The electronic newspaper is an enhanced version of the printed paper with additional photos, movie trailers and video as well as links to related web sites.

It is the first step for the interactive newspaper which will soon be available online for a subscription fee. The CD version is available for 25 cents at select newsstands. The *eBeacon* contains all advertising, including classified found in the printed version.

Gary Gardiner of The Associated Press in Columbus has outdone himself. His monthly photo report newsletter has a weekly version that shows the highlights of what members across the state have submitted to the AP. The PDF file is a great way to get a look at what your friends are shooting across Ohio.

WKYC-TV Chief Photographer **Peter Miller** died of cancer February 25 at the age of 63.

Miller covered nearly every major story in Cleveland for 42 years, He began his television career with WJW in 1959. He then joined WKYC in 1985.

Miller won eight Emmys from the National Academy of Television and Radio Artists. Four years ago, he was part of the WKYC team that took first place honors from the Association for Women in Communications for the report, ``On Schindler's List."

The Cleveland Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists bestowed their Distinguished Service Award to Miller posthumously in June. The award is the highest honor a chapter can bestow.

WKYC Special Projects Editor **Greg Hickey** will be part of the faculty of the NPPA's fall editing workshop in Salt Lake City. Greg is a multiple Emmy winning editor and an expert in nonlinear editing on the Avid system.

Only time will tell before we know for sure but, **Brynne Shaw** of *The Plain Dealer* could be the weakest link. Shaw was selected to be a contestant on the popular new prime time game show The Weakest Link. The show was being taped the first week of August and if selected will air later this fall.

By now I'm sure she has heard every weakest link one liner imaginable so we'll let her off the hook here and hope that her rewards are worth all the grief friends and co-workers probably put her through.

In the world of cutbacks July 31 was the last day of work for 18 employees in the newsroom at the *Akron Beacon Journal*. The 18 volunteers received early retirement or buyout packages offered by Knight-Ridder. No members of the photography department were eligible for the offer.

The newsroom cuts are the second this year at the Beacon. In April a reduction in force resulted in the elimination of 16 positions - eight through dismissals and eight through voluntary resignations.

Board approves rule changes for 2002, still contest to go digital

ONPA BOARD MEETING – 7/29/2001 The Ohio News Photographers Association Board held a meeting in Akron on Sunday, July 29, 2001. Present were Bob DeMay, Ed Suba Jr., Vince Shivers, Kimberly Barth and Dave Andersen.

The meeting began with Barth giving the treasurers report. She stated that the ONPA has \$5,000 in the checking account and \$7,000 in a new savings account that earns more interest than the checking.

Final figures are in for the 2001 convention held at Attwood Lodge. The total loss for the organization was \$3,816.82. The largest expenses were posters commemorating the 50th anniversary, speakers and complimentary dinners for life members. The event generated \$7,900 of income.

Next years event will be in Mansfield on March 22-23 and is being chaired by David Polcyn of *The News Journal*.

ONPA membership has remained steady for 2001. Including life members we presently have 309 members which is just slightly ahead of last year. There are still a few stragglers who have not paid their 2001 dues so numbers may improve.

The ONPA has received it's second interest payment of \$13,192 from the George Smallsreed Estate. The trustee of the account said that we had a excellent year but not to plan on those results in future years. In a typical year the payment will be between \$6,000 and \$9,000.

The last financial item came from DeMay who said the organization still has not received it's yearly \$400 stipend from the NPPA. We were behind two payments and have received one. We are not alone in this, other chapters are reporting similar results as NPPA gets its house in order. In order to qualify, at least half the ONPA members have to be NPPA members.

Next on the agenda was the upcoming election. Andersen said that members will have ballots in their mailboxes by November 1st. The Deadline for returning them will be November 30th. The only contested race will be for secretary. Remember to vote!

Shivers was up next with the TV report. A lot of work is going into revamping the entry and critique forms for both the clip and year end contests. A major addition will be a statement about honesty in what members enter. Both the ONPA and NPPA have had ethical problems with some of the entries.

The year-end contest will continue to use a point system to determine the TV Photographer of the Year. The deadline will have to be moved up a week or two because the convention is a week earlier than normal.

We are continuing to try to get more TV members. Besides the photographers around the state, the ONPA will be targeting college students and TV reporters. A new "teamwork" category will be added to the year end contest.

The language is still to be worked out but the new category will recognize the work that photographers, reporters and editors do together.

Help! We are in need of a new TV clip contest chairperson. Dave Colabine is leaving Ohio for a new job in Pittsburgh. We thank him for his service and wish him success. It was his initiative that made it possible for television members in Ohio to have a quarterly clip contest, which is now in its third year.


A motion was made and passed for the ONPA to continue to sponsor "The Buckeye." It is a one-day TV seminar held annually in different cities around the state.

The board approved a recommendation by Still Clip Contest Chairman, Chris Parker to move up the deadline for the contest. Beginning in January 2002, the deadline will be changed from "postmarked" by the 7th of the month to "in the hands of chairman" by the 7th. This is the same deadline as the NPPA clip contest.

We will also have a standardized entry from for the 2002 clip contest. It will be published in the newsletter and a pdf file will be available on our website – onpa.org. This will make the clip chairman's job a little easier when sorting.

A quarterly still picture editing contest will also be added in 2002. Susan Kirkman, Director of Photography at the Akron Beacon Journal has volunteered to be contest chairman. Rules have yet to be approved.

Several changes were made to the Annual Still Contest. There will be new language added as to what photographs are eligible for entry. It reads: No photograph previously entered in the seminar competition may be entered again. Photographs in a pic-



The feature category will be split into "enterprise feature" and "assigned feature." The category descriptions break down

The category descriptions break down as follows: Enterprise feature -- a self generated general human interest photo, typically is published as lines only, wild or solo art. This will include features found cruising or found at events such as fairs, parades, etc.

Assigned feature -- A feature photograph that accompanies an assigned story and can include single entries from picture stories.

In the Picture Usage category, weekly papers will be included in the Under 100,000 circulation. The required date for weeklies will be an issue from the same week as the required date for dailies.

The Illustration category will be split into Product Illustration and Issue Illustration. Product illustrations will include such things as food, clothing, appliances, autos, etc.. The Issue Illustration will be photographs that convey a particular idea or editorial concept.

The 2001 Annual Still Contest will be digital. Entries will be submitted on CD's or Zip discs. This ends the expense and trouble of making slides. DeMay is presently reviewing judging software used by Indiana. Finally, the board will be looking into a

Finally, the board will be looking into a free site in the Columbus area to hold the judging. Kim Barth will contact Ohio State to inquire about what facilities may be open for our use.

In new business, the board approved a motion to help sponsor a free one-day digital seminar proposed by Phil Long. It will be held December 7th and 8th at Kent State University. One day is for students and the other is for the working press. Details will be in the next issue of the newsletter.

The final item before the board was to approve funding to send an ONPA representative each year to the Annual NPPA Convention. The motion passed.


Colabine to remain as TV clip chairman

Associated Press Society of Ohio award winners for 2000

COLUMBUS, Ohio -- Newspapers in Columbus, Cincinnati, Sandusky, Marietta and Coshocton were named the best in the state in the annual Associated Press Society of Ohio news competition.

General Excellence awards for 2000 went to *The Columbus Dispatch, The Cincinnati Post, Sandusky Register, The Marietta Times,* and *The Cosocton Tribune.*

The Dayton Daily News won the First Amendment Award for outstanding accomplishment in pursuing freedom of information on behalf of the public for its efforts to obtain documents and other information related to the hiring of the city's school superintendent.

Sixty-three daily newspapers submitted 3,375 entries in the contest, which featured stories, editorials, columns, graphics and photos from 2000.

Entries were judged by editors from the St. Augustine (Fla.) Record, Greenwich (Conn.) Time, Anniston (Ala.) Star, The Gadsden (Ala.) Times, The Arlington (Va.) Journal and The Baltimore Sun.

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still clip rules

Photos must be entered in the month published. A photo can be entered only after its initial publication. Sort clips by category:

Spot news: A picture of an unscheduled event for which no advanced planning was possible. Examples: fires, accidents and natural disasters. General news: A picture of a scheduled political, social or cultural event for which advance planning was possible. An assigned and/or scheduled news event. Example: Demonstrations, funerals, trials and promotional events. Portrait: A picture of a person that reveals the essence of the subjects character. Sports: An unposed sports related picture, either feature or action. Sports related portraits should be entered in the portrait category. Feature single: A general human interest photo. Multiple picture: A photo story, sequence or series of any subject matter. **Illustration:** A created picture, not a found situation or portrait. Intended to clarify or dramatize a pre-conceived idea. This would include illustrations depicting food, fashion, industrial or editorial topics. This category will be judged quarterly but clips must be entered in the month published.

Remove your name and affiliation from the front of the clip. Affix a label with your name, publication, address, category and date of publication on the back. Include a separate sheet of paper with your name, address and total number of clips entered.

Layouts are judged as a single entry but single pictures from a layout can be entered also. You must submit another clip of the single image from the layout in this case.

Wire service photographers and stringers may enter prints but they must be signed on the back by a supervisor noting they had been transmitted.

Each entrant is limited to a total of nine clips per month. The clip contest is open to all ONPA members in good standing who live or work in Ohio during the month entered. The ONPA clip contest is not affiliated with the NPPA Region 4 clip contest. Mail clips by the 7th of the month following publication to:
